

❖ ORDINARY STEWARDSHIP

This is the disciplined practice of paying attention to the world around us and treating everything as God's creation because it is God's. It is the regular attention to family, church, work, community, and ourselves. Ordinary stewardship requires us to keep these needs in balance so that one piece doesn't begin to possess or oppress us.

The practice of returning to God a part of all that God has given to us reminds us that all we have is sacred. Each Fall you have an opportunity to make a financial pledge to the parish and indicate your interest in parish ministries.

❖ SPECIAL STEWARDSHIP

Special occasions arise that call on us to give time and money beyond our ordinary giving. They involve increased risk and encourage us to experience sacrificial giving. These may be disasters or a need to reach an important goal.

Be open to special needs in the community: Summer Mission Projects, holiday giving for our Outreach partners, the Community Cupboard, the national church's Episcopal Relief and Development fund. The parish and diocese will from time to time have capital campaigns.

❖ LEGACY STEWARDSHIP

This may be the touchstone for the four modes of stewardship listed here. You are going to leave this physical world. You can choose now how you are going to respond to God's love. What example of stewardship will remain when you are gone? Will there be signs that you were a good steward?

How did you treat family, friends, neighbor, or stranger?

Will you be remembered as a faithful person who was found in church most Sundays? ... Who was generous in supporting the ministry of your congregation? ... Who prayed and read the Bible?

Discerning and carrying out God's purpose is the primary purpose of our lives. The gifts we have been given, time, talent, and money, are to be used for that purpose. The primary role of the church is to guide individuals in discernment of the mission for their lives and use of their resources in accomplishing it.

YOUR CALL, YOUR LIFE
